CAPITAL CAMPAIGN LAUNCHED FOR "MONSIGNOR TOOMEY ANNEX"

The Catholic Youth Organization hopes to break ground this fall on a 4,600 square foot addition to the main building of its Yardville childcare site and camp in Hamilton Township. The "Monsignor Toomey Annex," will be named in honor of Monsignor Leonard R. Toomey, founder and first Director of the CYO. It will add critically needed indoor space to the site that currently serves more than 850 children annually.

The CYO is working with the Diocesan Building Commission to finalize plans for the addition, which is estimated to cost approximately \$940,000. CYO has already succeeded in procuring several financial commitments toward the project, and is now launching a capital campaign to complete project funding. Originally built in 1958 and used as the main indoor structure for CYO Yardville's summer day camp, the building was expanded and renovated in 2002 to better serve the growing camp. In September 2004, classrooms were constructed in the building, and CYO Yardville became a year-round licensed childcare center, initiating a pre-school and school age after school program at the site, in addition to the popular summer day camp. CYO Yardville currently serves more than 850 children, ages 3-15, in pre-school, after school, summer day camp, teen travel camp, swim lessons, and peewee sports programs, including T-ball, soccer and basketball.

The addition will include a large open area with a divider to allow for separation into two smaller spaces; sections of retractable bleachers; portable basketball hoops; bathroom facilities; and a storage area. It will provide space for play on hot and/or inclement weather days, performances, graduation ceremonies, parent meetings, staff development workshops, community gatherings, as well as an indoor venue for physical education and related activities.

The annex is being named in honor of Monsignor Leonard R. Toomey, who not only had the foresight to convince the Diocese of Trenton to purchase the 23-acre site of the old Springdale Park in the Yardville section of Hamilton Township, but the vision and perseverance, with the help of Monsignor Michael McCorristin and a group of tireless volunteers, to build the original CYO camp facility, that continues to provide essential childcare services today for children and families. One of Monsignor Toomey's last pub-

lic appearances before his death in September 2008 was at the CYO Yardville Day Camp's 50th anniversary picnic. Though not feeling well at the time, he couldn't miss the opportunity to celebrate the occasion with friends and share fond memories of camp activities and campers.

INTERMEDIATE SOCCER LEAGUE COMING TO YARDVILLE

On the success of the Pee Wee Soccer League, the CYO Yardville is launching an Intermediate Co-ed Soccer League for September 2012! The Pee Wee Soccer Program has grown from 4 teams with 40 players to 6 teams with 75 players over the last six years, and now the demand is there for a second level league. The league will be for 6 and 7 year old boys and girls, an advancement from the Pee Wee Soccer League for 4 and 5 year olds and below first level recreational competitive soccer. Games will be played mostly on Saturday afternoons at the CYO Yardville Soccer field from September 22 through early November. The exact end date will be determined on weather, number of teams, and participants.

The approximate field size will be 105 feet long by 85 feet wide with the approximate goal size 8 x 5 with teams of 8 vs. 8 (including a goalie) participating at one time. The age requirements are that the players must be either age 6 or 7 by September 22, 2012. The registration fee is \$70. Sponsorship opportunities are available and volunteer coaches needed. The Mercer County CYO Soccer Season began on Monday, April 16th. This year there are 8 teams in the Girls Soccer League and 6 teams in the Boys Soccer League. The regular season is scheduled to conclude at the end of May with the playoffs ending in early June. DIOCESAN BASKETBALL TOURNAMENT:

The Diocesan Basketball Tournament returned to Mercer County in March following the conclusion of the CYO Basketball Playoffs. Each of the four counties in the Diocese (Mercer, Burlington, Monmouth and Ocean) were represented as a total of 8 teams (2 from each county) qualified for this year's tournament in each of the four divisions (GJV, BJV, GV & BV). On Sunday, March 11th, after an exciting week-long tournament, St. Catharine's (Spring Lake) captured the GJV title by defeating St. Gregory's while St. Mary's of the Lakes (Medford) won the BJV title. In Varsity action, Trenton Catholic Academy won the girls title by defeating St. Mary's (New Monmouth) while St. Thomas the Apostle (Old Bridge) won the Boys Championship.

CYO BASKETBALL:

The Mercer County CYO celebrated its 59th season of CYO Basketball during the 2011-12 season. This year there were a total of 70 teams that participated in the 7 CYO Leagues for elementary school-aged children and the Boys High School League. Congratulations to all of this year's winners that were crowned in March. In CYO playoff action, St. Gregory's captured the title for the Girls Freshmen Playoffs which concluded their undefeated season. In the Boys Freshmen League, Trenton Catholic Academy defended their title by going undefeated and captured the championship for the Blue Division while St. Gregory's also defended their title and won the championship for the Red and White Division. In Junior Varsity playoff action, St. Gregory's won on the girls side completing their undefeated season, while Trenton Catholic Academy won on the boys side also going undefeated. In Varsity playoff action, Trenton Catholic Academy went undefeated on the girls side and won the title while in Boys Varsity action, the team from Our Lady of Sorrows / St. Anthony's also went undefeated and won the title.
