CONSTRUCTION BEGINS ON THE MONSIGNOR TOOMEY ANNEX

The first of two steps on the Monsignor Toomey Annex construction has begun! Part 1 was the relocation of a storm sewer pipe from Yardville-Allentown Rd. that was located directly under where the annex will be. The pipe has been moved and the area made safe and ready for Summer Camp. Part 2, the actual building construction will start right after Labor Day and is expected to be completed by March, 2014. The addition will include a large open area with a divider to allow for separation into two smaller spaces; sections of bleachers; portable basketball hoops; and bathroom facilities. It will provide space for play on hot and/or inclement weather days, performances, graduation ceremonies, parent meetings, staff development workshops, community gatherings, an indoor venue for physical education, and home of the Pee Wee and Intermediate Basketball League.

The annex is being named in honor of Monsignor Leonard R. Toomey, who not only had the foresight to convince the Diocese of Trenton to purchase the 23-acre site of the old Springdale Park in the Yardville section of Hamilton, but the vision and perseverance, with the help of Monsignor

EWING CYO PRE-K PARTICIPATES IN STUDY TO EXPAND KIDSBRIDGE MUSEUM

On Monday, April 22, the Pre-K classroom led by Ms. Hannah Knight and Mrs. Helen Woodland took a trip to the Kidsbridge Museum at The College of New Jersey. This visit was part of Ewing Pre-School's participation in a study on Anti-Bullying in Pre-School Classrooms that is being conducted by Dr. Blythe Hinitz, a distinguished professor of education at TCNJ. The museum recently added 4 pre-school stations to its Tolerance exhibit and the children had the chance to rotate through each station and participate in a number of activities.

Ms. Knight, Mrs. Woodland and Ewing Education Director, Robyn Fratticcioli observed the children at each station and later offered feedback to museum staff about what was working and what could possibly be improved or expanded upon.

The museum visit was just one component of CYO's participation in Dr Hinitz's efforts. The class is also serving as a control group in her study which requires teachers to

give surveys to the students on topics such as Telling vs. Tattling, Alike & Different, and Feeling Welcome. Questions were posed to the children before they visited the museum as well as after to determine if exposure to the concepts at the museum would have any impact on their responses.

Participation in this study serves as the perfect segue into an Anti-Bullying curriculum that Mrs. Fratticcioli plans to implement throughout our pre-school this coming fall.
